## Is Daylight Savings Worth the Work? Lydia Shenvi Staff

On Sunday, March 10, 2024, families all over America will reset their clocks--officially at 2:00 AM. Suddenly, the sun will seem to set an hour later. 2:00 AM will become 3:00 AM during daylight savings. And in November, everyone will reset their clocks again. 3:00 AM will again become 2:00 AM. But why? Why do we engage in this mass clock-changing twice a year, and what is its purpose?

Business owners may profit from the clock change. If adults return from work and find that the sun is still fairly high in the sky, chances are higher that they'd go out and buy things or entertain themselves. Crime rates also decrease, as the likelihood of getting caught breaking the law when the sun is still up is much greater than when it's dark. Electric lighting does not have this effect. Some people even argue that it reduces energy consumption, because one's schedule more closely matches that of the sun.

On the other hand, studies have also shown that daylight savings disrupts a person's circadian rhythm--AKA their sleep schedule--which can result in sleep deprivation. It also imposes unnecessary challenges for farmers, since dew, livestock behavior, and other common elements of an agricultural job are generally determined by the sun.

Variants of changing schedules date back to almost 300 years ago. In 1784, Benjamin Franklin observed that many people in Paris stayed up late, past sundown, and slept in past sunup. He suggested that Parisians adapt their summer schedules to that of the sun, thereby conserving fuel.


However, Franklin would not live to see his idea bear fruit. Official times hadn't even been established in his day. Only 100 years later would railroad companies connect their extreme confusion to the lack of standard time. During the 19th century, schedules really were set according to the sun, but they were decided locally and varied from town to town. At 12:00 in one city, it might be 12:30 in another. Difficulties arose for punctual deliveries in the railroad business due to this inconsistency. In the 1840 s, the British implemented standard time for railroad companies, and America soon followed.

Built on the foundation of standard time, Benjamin Franklin's idea reemerged through a British man named William Willett in the 1900s. He noticed that many of London's citizens squandered much of their summer mornings lounging in bed. A passionate golfer, Willett also disliked terminating his rounds at sundown. Therefore, he proposed to the British Parliament in 1909 to "spring forward" during the summer. Supportive, parliament member Robert Pearce introduced the Daylight Savings Bill and other similar bills in subsequent years, each failing.

Less than a decade later, in the heat of World War I, Germany established "Sommerzeit," a schedule better adapted to solar hours in order to conserve energy. Through the Standard Time Act of 1918, America followed suit for seven months. A year-round schedule called "War Time" was reestablished during World War II. After the war, local governments could choose when to observe daylight savings until the 1966 Uniform Time Act, reinstituting standardized time.

In the winter of 1974 , permanent daylight savings was introduced, but parents shared concern for children walking to school in the dark. The act was repealed.

Countless times, there have been instances of revoking and reimplementing daylight savings; in the US; for instance, extension of daylight savings to seven months in 1986; extension to eight months in 2005; in 2007, when American shifting dates were established; repeated bills to make daylight savings permanent since 2018, and three others to abolish it in 2020, 2022, and 2023.

The greatest controversy over daylight savings is whether it actually conserves energy. A study in 2017 claimed that it results in electricity savings of 0.3 percent. Others suggested that it increased the use of motor oil, but the US Department of Energy reported that daylight savings did not increase motor fuel usage, and in fact conserved electricity by $0.5 \%$ per day. The same year, a study by the National Bureau of Economic Research claimed it increased electricity demand by $1 \%$, also increasing average electricity bills in Indiana by as much as $\$ 9$ million.

2021-2022 studies by the National Sleep Foundation, CBS, and Monmouth University shows that more Americans would prefer permanent daylight savings, but a 2019 study by the National Opinion Research Center and a 2021 study by the Associated Press state that more Americans would prefer standard time.

So does daylight savings really fulfill its intended purpose? Or does it harm the economy and the environment? And with contradictory evidence and complex history, who can tell?

Should We Continue Climbing Everest?

On May 29, 1953, four days before Queen Elizabeth II's Coronation, Edmund Hillary and Tenzing Norgay summited Mt. Everest or, its native name, Mt. Sagarmatha, becoming the first in the world to do so. They probably thought nothing lived on the mountain, but they were wrong. Several types of life live on the side of the mountain. Himalayan Black Bears live on the mountain up to altitudes of about $14,000 \mathrm{ft}$. Several animals live in Sagarmāthā national park, which is named after the mountain. We humans are polluting this beautiful park, just so we can climb a mountain. Some people say that humans should stop climbing Everest because they are polluting the area with trash and disease, but, contrary to popular belief, experts on the topic say humans do not pollute as much as believed, and think that people who can stop these bad habits should be able to continue
 climbing Mt. Everest. However, this should only continue if changes are made such as better conditions for the climbers and the requirement to be a skilled climber. Some people have practiced their climbing skill to reach the summit by climbing smaller mountains. If people want to climb Mt. Everest, they should not put other people's lives in danger.
Mt Everest has extremely dangerous conditions, especially to inexperienced climbers. According to weforum.org, Everest has approximately a $14.1 \%$ fatality rate. One deadly phenom enon that occurs on the mountain is Avalanches. Avalanches could get climbers and sherpas injured or lead them to die. Another, is the lack of O2. At the top of the mountain, it is known as the death zone. O2 levels are extremely low there due to the altitude. Climbers might get altitude sickness, making them weak and confused. However, climbers can bring oxygen tanks to breathe. Along with this, if they stay up in the cold for too long, they can get frostbite, a disease where the skin and flesh on fingers and toes turn black and freeze, and sometimes have to be amputated. The freeing wind can reach up to 50 mph and blizzards are common. The article: "Mt Everest's Death Zone" says,"Too much time in these conditions can be lethal". Inexperienced climbers might not know how to deal with these conditions or how to avoid them. Along with the previous natural conditions, there are man-made conditions that are also hazardous such as the littering on the mountain and the corpses on the mountain still.
Large crowds of people rush to the top, leaving large piles of trash behind. Humans can also carry disease on the mountain. When people die on Everest, they don't decompose, or get picked up due to the freezing temperatures. This leads to disease becoming frozen in time, waiting to wake up, and a grim reminder to those who take the challenge. People have to take are of the mountain if they are using it. If they can clean their house, they can clean their own trash.
Some people want to climb Everest however. Summiting Mt. Everest is an amazing accomplishment that some have dreamed of, or practiced for by climbing smaller mountains. According to Mt Everest's Death Zone, "plenty of other places are just as exciting and much less dangerous." One such example could be the tallest mountain in North America, Denali, formerly Mt McKinley. Along with the fact that people wish to climb Everest, the economy of Nepal heavily relies heavily on tourists.
The average national wage in Nepal is less than $\$ 900$ compared to $\$ 50,000$ in the USA. There are approximately 35,000 visitors each year and each summit costs up to $\$ 100,000$. The money tourists spend on tours and guides is crucial to the smaller economy of Nepal, which has a GDP (gross domestic product) of 33 Billion USD, and a GDP per capita of around $\$ 1,000$. Even Singapore, a microstate, has a GDP of $\$ 340,000,000,10 \mathrm{x}$ as much, and a GDP per capita of $\$ 60,000,60 \mathrm{x}$ as much! In the economy of a large first world country, like the USA, the money climbers spend wouldn't put a dent in the economy, but in Nepal, they are dependent on it.
Mt. Everest is an exceptional mountain, and people should continue climbing it, but only if they make, and keep, the mountain clean. People should also be extremely skilled climbers, in order to prevent all the injuries. But if we stop climbing completely, Nepal's economy could, and likely will implode and collapse. If people wish to climb Everest, they should be able to, but not by putting other climbers and sherpas at risk. What should be done?
